As the summer winds down, the Select Board calendar picks back up. In September we will be finalizing the warrant for the October 28 Special Town Meeting. The major item at the meeting will be the replacement of Shaker Lane School, which will require a $\frac{2}{3}$ vote to pass. A second vote – a ballot measure on November 1 to authorize the debt exclusion to pay for Littleton's portion of the new building costs – must *also* pass by a majority. These votes represent our only opportunity to take advantage of a \$38.1 million state grant towards the costs of building the new school. We hope that you will make a plan to attend Special Town Meeting on October 28 and to go to the polls on November 1 for these crucial votes. Three Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacons (RRFBs) are now installed and operational on Great Road. The beacons are located at Baldwin Hill Road, Castle in the Trees, and New Estate/Pond Side intersections of King Street. We are thrilled that these RRFBs were operating on the first day of school to keep Littleton's children and all residents safer. Thanks to our state officials, Mass DOT, and LELD for making this happen! Keep your eyes peeled for additional RRFBs on Goldsmith near Shaker Lane, to be installed this Fall.

From the Desk of the Town Administrator



I'm not letting this go. I feel strongly about this issue. Not replacing our outdated Shaker Lane School can have significant negative impacts on both students' education and Littleton as a whole. The current school lacks modern infrastructure, technology, and learning resources, which are essential for providing a high-quality education. Students in such environments may struggle with inadequate classrooms, along with gym, art, music and science areas due to space challenges, and limited access to digital tools, hindering their academic growth and preparedness for future challenges.



On a broader scale, by not building a new school, I don't see how the town does not suffer from the stagnation of our early educational standards, which the entire community has worked so hard to achieve. Remaining with an obsolete school can create a perception of a lack of progress, discouraging prospective families and educators from settling in the area. This can lead to decreased town reputation, lower property values, and reduced economic development. Additionally, the community misses out on the opportunity to attract talented teachers and innovative programs that modern facilities can support.

Building codes and safety standards evolve over time. The school building as it stands today lacks adequate space, proper ventilation, which hinders the teacher's ability to teach and the students' ability to learn. Furthermore, the building does not meet contemporary safety requirements, including seismic standards, fire codes, and accessibility guidelines. Rehabilitating the building for compliance will cost the Littleton taxpayer MORE than building the proposed new school and may still leave gaps in safety.

What? Modular classrooms are the temporary solution? Is eleven (11) years temporary? The proposed construction start date will signify 11 years since Littleton applied to the MSBA and was accepted into their Program. (I can assure you, it's going to be longer than 11 years the next time we have an opportunity to have the financial support of the MSBA for a new Shaker Lane School) Modular's, while temporarily helpful, often lacks the full integration of facilities, resources, and aesthetic quality necessary for fostering engagement and collaboration among students, never mind there outrageous cost.

Investing in a new, modern grammar school can have numerous positive impacts on the community. It can serve as a catalyst for new families and encouraging local businesses to thrive. State-of-the-art facilities not only enhance the learning experience for students but also foster a sense of pride and unity within the community. Look at the positive impact of our new Library and Senior Center have had. A well-equipped school will attract high-quality teachers and staff, who are essential for providing a competitive and comprehensive education. This, in turn, prepares students better for their education that's ahead of them.

From the Desk of the Town Administrator



Community involvement and support are crucial in this process. By investing in education infrastructure, the town demonstrates its commitment to its residents and the future of its youth. Such investment can lead to increased property values, improved safety, and a more vibrant, dynamic community where everyone can thrive. Neglecting to build a new grammar school could have long-term detrimental effects. Conversely, proactive investment is a strategic move that benefits students, families, and the entire community, paving the way for Littleton's continued sustainable growth and prosperity.



In closing, I have focused so much on the structure, and I have yet to mention one vital component in Littleton's educational system, the teachers and staff. Through all the challenges the children face at the Shaker Lane School, the real heroes are the teachers and staff. Having witnessed the dedication, resourcefulness, enthusiastic, and supportive attitude of the teachers and staff during a typical day, which from someone not familiar to the demands and expectations in a school environment, would appear to be chaos, whereas in actuality, it's a finely tuned machine. Thank you for all you do, day-in and day-out!

Tips and Reminders for use of the Towns Transfer Station

- Solid Waste (trash) must be disposed of in a PAYT purple bag.
- The PAYT bags are one time use only.
- A sticker must be purchased prior to use of the Transfer Station.
- The swap shop is available for reusable household items in good condition. Please do not leave **Hazardous Materials, Medical waste, Medical Supplies or broken/unusable items.** These items are prohibited and can result in fines and/or suspension of the Transfer Station use sticker.
- The cardboard compactor is for **cardboard and mixed paper only.** No packing materials, Styrofoam or plastic bags are accepted in the cardboard compactor.
- Hazardous Waste can be disposed of at the Devens Regional Household Hazardous Products Collection Center for a fee. Please see www.devenshhw.com for more information.
- Later this fall, The Town will be installing an additional compactor at the transfer station to offer a more streamlined process for single stream recycling. As this project begins, signage and additional information will be posted at the transfer station and on the Towns website to help with the process.

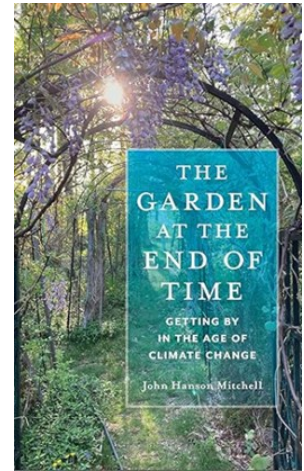


Adult Programming

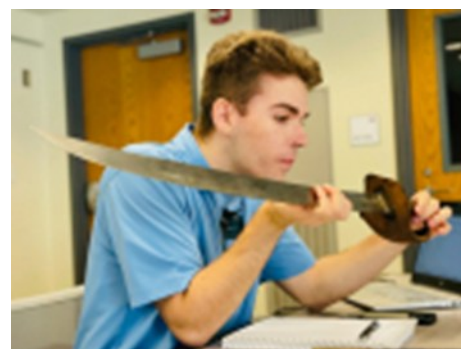
Board game night for adults only. We have plenty of board games or you can bring your own!

Spotlight: Wildfire and Drought

The hot temperatures and low rainfall we've experienced this summer are increasing the likelihood of a drought, as well as increasing the chance of wildfire on our conservation lands. Extended periods without rain leave forests, fields, and wetlands unusually dry, creating conditions where even a small spark can spread into a dangerous blaze. Drought not only heightens the risk of ignition but also stresses plants and wildlife, making habitats less resilient and slowing the natural recovery process after fire. To learn more about drought and get the latest information on the drought levels across Massachusetts, go to mass.gov/drought-monitoring.



While fire is a natural part of the ecosystem, uncontrolled burns can threaten houses, infrastructure, and future ecological regeneration.

What can you do to help?

On Town Conservation Land:

- Remember that building campfires or discharging firearms is not allowed on Town Conservation land and trails.
- Don't litter! Ensure cigarettes are fully extinguished before disposing in a trashcan.
- Report any signs of fire right away.



On your own property:

- Avoid outdoor burning or fireworks during dry periods.
- Check that lawnmowers, grills, or vehicles aren't giving off sparks near dry grass or brush.
- Store firewood away from your house or other structures.
- Conserve water to reduce water stress in the future.

School Committee



Greetings from the Littleton School Committee!

We're excited to begin a new school year together, filled with continued opportunities for learning and growth. The first day for students was Tuesday, August 26, and it was great to have the schools bustling with energy once again.

We'd like to share an exciting update about plans for a new Shaker Lane School. During the summer, the Shaker Lane Building Committee completed the schematic design phase of the Shaker Lane Building Project and submitted it to the Massachusetts School Building Authority (MSBA). On August 27 the MSBA Board of Directors

moved the Shaker Lane building project into the design phase, which is an important threshold on our way to a new building. The board approved a grant of approximately \$38 million, based on a review and audit of all project costs incurred by the town. This is a larger grant than we were anticipating, which will ultimately reduce the cost to taxpayers. For up-to-date numbers on the estimated tax implications for residents, please see yesforlittleton.org. The YES for Littleton website is also a convenient place to get answers to a wide range of questions residents may have about the project.

We, as Littleton citizens, have an important role to play in order to receive this grant from the MSBA. The town needs to vote to approve the project. **A special town meeting will be held on October 28th.** If a "yes" vote passes, the Town of Littleton will hold **a ballot vote on November 1st.** We strongly encourage our community's active participation in this crucial vote.

This project affects all of us, whether or not we have school-aged children. High quality schools and a community that cares for its youngest citizens are values we all share.

Gearing Up for School

In the United States in 2023, there were approximately—

- 3,700 children and infants clothing stores
- 18,200 shoe stores
- 2,400 department stores
- 4,200 office supply and stationery stores
- 5,600 bookstores

Note: These are for establishments with employees.



Roll Call

- The nation's 5.7 million teachers will return to the classroom this fall to educate an estimated 54.1 million students aged 3 years and older enrolled in K-12.
- Of those teachers, nearly 56% are elementary or middle school teachers and more than 78% are female.
- Almost half (48.5%) of 3 to 4 year olds are enrolled in preschool.

Education Pays Off

In 2023, workers made different average yearly salaries based on their education level.*

- People with a bachelor's degree made about \$87,000.
- High school graduates and GED recipients made about \$47,000.
- Those with an education below ninth grade made about \$38,000.

*This represents workers aged 18 and older with earnings.

Hitting the Books

- About \$16,526: The current spending per pupil amount (in dollars) for elementary and secondary public school systems in the United States in FY 2023.

Average per pupil current spending for each region:

- Northeast: \$25,330
- West: \$16,630
- Midwest: \$16,220
- South: \$13,344
