Message From Your Selectboard

On Tuesday, October 28 more than 900 people attended Special Town Meeting on October 28. Article 1, to support the building of a new Shaker Lane, passed by a 93% majority. The borrowing ballot question passed by nearly 82% with a turnout of about 1,950. The turnout and results for these votes were a testament to the power of cooperative effort. Superintendent Clenchy, Principal Michelle Kane, Town Administrator Jim Duggan, the Shaker Lane Building Committee, the Finance Committee, the School Committee and the Permanent Municipal Building Committee all put in an enormous amount of work to shepherd this project through the two votes, and the town owes them a debt of gratitude. I also want to thank everyone who showed up to vote, check-in, set-up, broadcast, and provide childcare for these events.

Also passed at Special Town Meeting was an expansion of the Senior Tax Deferral program. The program now has a higher income limit, and going forward, Littleton's limit will automatically match the state's maximum allowable limit. This is but one tax relief program available to those in need. I encourage anyone who is struggling or who has questions to contact the Town Assessor's office and our Department of Elder and Human Services to discuss what programs may be available.

We plan to review what worked well and what needs improvement for Town Meeting. Please reach out or attend a Select Board meeting to tell us what you think.

Starting with the Town Meeting coordinating with the Town of Groton to borrow their 600 clickers and the IT Department matching up each clicker with our system. Much thanks to Nancy Glencross for her dedication and determination along with Tom McLaughlin in troubleshooting to get it done behind the scenes so when everyone showed up not a single person would know that there were any glitches to get things to work perfectly on the night of Town Meeting. To Mark Crory and his team at LCTV that came together to get the Town Meeting aired live without any hitches between the communication between the two rooms, communication in the gymnasium so all could be heard without any problem. To George Sanders, George Dumas & Eric Derba and Erik Bentley and his crew that helped to set down the flooring and set up 1000 chairs and the tables on Monday and Tuesday. To the Fire Chief and new Fire Prevention Captain for giving us the thumbs up for our set up and the LPD for keeping the peace at Town Meeting. To Charlie Ellis for stepping up as our Assistant Town Moderator, for sticking it out the whole night my appreciation to you is insurmountable. To all the volunteers that checked in the voters while taking an average of only 4 seconds for each resident, job well done. To the volunteers that stayed after Town Meeting to help clean up the cafeteria, The room was free and clear for the Middle School students in the morning. Finally, to the townspeople for showing up and remaining calm when there were 250 of you waiting in line to check in.

As you all may or may not know Articles One through 13 all passed, with 13 being a non-binding question and Article 14 no affirmative action was taken as the petitioner asked for the same.

Then on Thursday we started all over again. Early morning the Highway Department crew showed up at the Townhall to take everything that was needed to set up for the Election. Down to the gym we headed to set up the Election Booths. What a crew! Along with Erik Bentley and his staff, George Sanders and I started to set up the gym. Booths, tables, chairs, cords, voting machines, poll pads. You name it we had it. Four hours later the gym was transformed into an election area and ready to go for Saturday. All the while Andrew was still checking in Early Mail In votes to the State System. Friday absentee voters stopped by to vote in the office and voted right up until the "11th hour", so to speak, or Noon. Saturday morning came as the gym was opened by Erik Bentley bright and early and we started the day opening the machines and preparing the day for voting. Not a beat was skipped. No one would be the wiser as to how this all comes together. Teamwork, that is how this all works. LPD came to keep the polling location safe. Volunteers started showing up at 730am to prepare themselves for the day all to make it happen for the voters. Oaths of office were taken and at 8am the polls were opened. New volunteers came in about every four hours. Off and running until the last strike of the mallet to close the polls. Volunteers from LELWD as well as others came in to help tear down the booths and George Sanders help to show the way things needed to be done. Thanks for your experience George.

S&P Affirms Town of Littleton's Bond Rating of AAA

Standard and Poor's has affirmed the Town of Littleton's bond rating of AAA, its highest rating. S&P defines its AAA rating as "Extremely strong capacity to meet financial commitments. Highest Rating." The rating reflects S&P's assessment of the following factors for the town:

- Very strong economy - "very high-income metrics that we believe uplift the overall rating, and a tax base that continues to experience strong growth in residential assessed values in part due to the town's favorable location just 30 miles west of Boston"
- Strong budgetary performance – "with conservative assumptions that the town consistently outperforms, with long-term financial and capital plans that are annually updated and tied into its assumptions, along with a comprehensive host of policies, including investment, debt management, and reserve policies, as well as steps to mitigate cyber risk"
- Surplus Financial Operations - "with stable revenue from property taxes (74%), which have led to the town maintaining ample available reserves that compare favorably with those of peers at the same rating level"
- Elevated Fixed Costs - "we believe Littleton's fixed costs could add some budgetary pressure over the next few years, management has demonstrated a clear commitment to addressing unfunded retirement liabilities, as well as limited additional capital needs"

Sand for Seniors

Snow and ice are right around the corner! Sand for Seniors is a program designed to increase safety during the winter and was created for eligible seniors who are physically or financially unable to acquire their own bucket of an ice melt product. This program is available to senior Littleton residents who meet the following criteria:

-be a Senior Littleton resident; -live in their own home; -and are unable to physically get ice melt product OR unable to afford ice melt product. If you qualify, you will have a bucket of ice melt product delivered to your door by a staff member or volunteer for use on your property. Fuel Assistance

As we get into the cold weather now is the time to apply for fuel and heating assistance. For those who applied and were approved for the 2024-2025 season, you should have received your re-certification application for the 2025-2026 season. Safe Food Practices for a Healthy Thanksgiving

Thanksgiving is a time for family, friends, and great food, but foodborne illness can spoil even the best holiday meal. The Littleton Board of Health reminds residents to follow these food safety tips to keep your Thanksgiving feast safe and enjoyable:

1. Thawing the Turkey Safely

- Thaw your turkey in the refrigerator, not on the counter. Thawing at room temperature encourages bacterial growth. Allow 24 hours for every 4–5 pounds of turkey.
- For faster thawing, you may use cold water, changing the water every 30 minutes. Cook immediately after thawing.

2. Preparing and Handling Food

- Wash hands, utensils, and surfaces before and after handling raw poultry.
- Use separate cutting boards for raw meat and ready-to-eat foods to prevent cross-contamination.
- Avoid washing raw turkey. This spreads bacteria around your sink and counters.

3. Cooking Thoroughly

- Use a food thermometer to ensure the turkey reaches an internal temperature of 165°F in the thickest part of the breast, thigh, and stuffing (if cooked inside).

4. Serving and Storing Food

- Keep hot foods hot (above 140°F) and cold foods cold (below 40°F).
- Refrigerate leftovers within two hours of serving.
- Eat leftovers within 3–4 days

Diabetes Awareness:

- Stay active and choose balanced meals to help keep blood sugar levels stable.
- Schedule regular checkups and screenings with your healthcare provider.

- If you smoke, consider quitting. Help and resources are available through 1-800-QUIT-NOW or makesmokinghistory.org.
- Ask your doctor if you qualify for a low-dose CT scan, which can detect lung cancer early.
- Support clean indoor air and avoid secondhand smoke whenever possible.

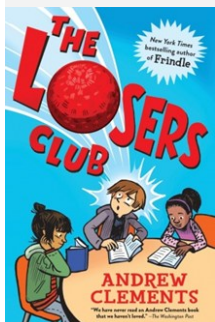

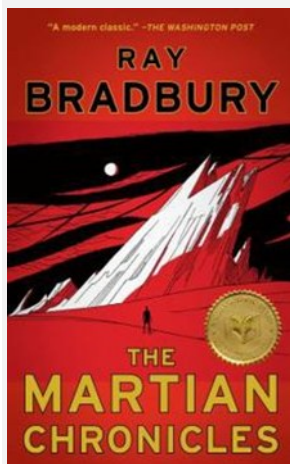

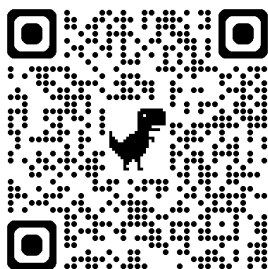

The Sound of Safety: Why Your Smoke and CO Detectors Should Have Voice Alerts

When it comes to keeping your family safe, smoke and carbon monoxide (CO) detectors are some of the most important devices in your home. These small pieces of technology save lives every day — but not all detectors are created equal.

If you're replacing a combination smoke and carbon monoxide detector, take a moment to make sure your new one includes a voice alert feature. This feature doesn't just sound a tone — it also announces the type of emergency, such as "Smoke detected" or "Carbon monoxide detected."

That voice alert can make a big difference. In an emergency, especially when you're just waking up, hearing a clear voice that identifies the danger helps you respond faster and more effectively. It also helps children and older adults understand what's happening and what action to take.

Another improvement in newer detectors is **location programming technology**. This allows you to label or program each detector by its room location — such as "Kitchen," "Bedroom," or "Basement." When an alarm sounds, the system can tell you exactly where the issue is happening. This feature not only helps during a real emergency, but it also makes it easier to track and identify **false alarms**, so you can address them quickly and reduce unnecessary confusion.

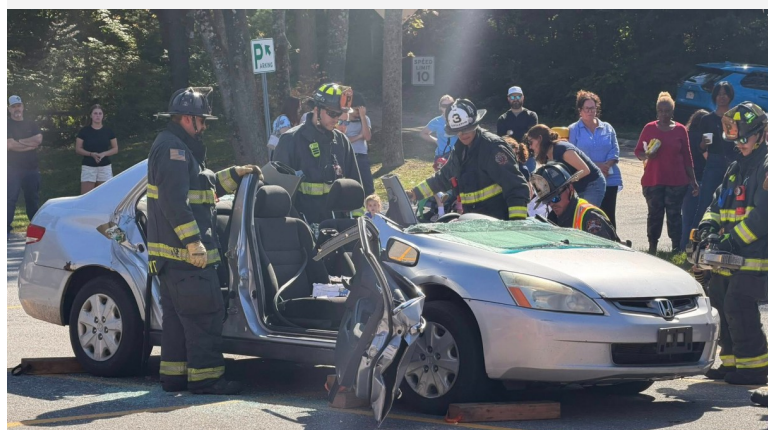
So next time you're at the hardware store or shopping online, check the box. Look for a **combination smoke and CO detector with tone, voice alert, and programmable location features**. It's a small upgrade that adds an extra layer of safety, clarity, and confidence when every second counts.

Test your alarms monthly, replace batteries as needed, and remember — working detectors save lives.

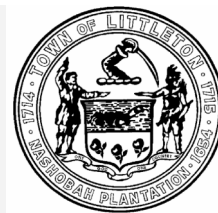
