Town Clerk's Corner

The New Year is here, who can believe it? With 2025 behind us there are plenty of things to look forward to in 2026.

In just weeks, Littleton residents will find in their mailboxes and post office boxes the Town Census. The Clerk's Office cannot express enough importance of the census.

- Did you know that the distribution of federal funding for various programs, including education, healthcare and infrastructure are based on our census data?
- An accurate census count ensures that local services such as schools and public programs get the resources they need based on actual population size.
- Failure to participate in the census can lead to removal from the active voting list, impacting voter registration and electoral representation.

These are just a few items that should help you to understand why you need to return your census, even if nothing has changed from year to year.

Also, with the New Year comes the preparation for town election and town meeting. It is never too early to decide to run for office. Nomination papers will be available in early January. Please check the Town Clerk's website for more details on positions that will be open for this May's Annual Town Election.

Thinking about dipping your toe into the water, just do it! At each select board meeting, the Town Administrator reminds the public of all the **appointed** board positions available. Please consider one of those spots if an **elected** position does not suit you.

Medication Storage During Coldest Months:

Cold temperatures can affect the safety and effectiveness of medications. The Littleton Board of Health reminds residents not to leave prescription or over-the-counter medications in cars, garages, or other unheated areas during winter. Freezing temperatures can reduce medication potency or cause damage. Store medications at room temperature unless otherwise directed, and contact your pharmacist if you are unsure about proper storage.

Christine Gallery Community Benefit Grant Award

The Littleton Board of Health is pleased to announce it has been awarded a \$3,900 Christine Gallery Community Grant from Emerson Hospital to support a Memory Café program. In partnership with the Littleton Council on Aging (COA), the program will be implemented through 2026. Memory Cafés provide a welcoming, social environment for individuals experiencing memory changes, dementia, or Alzheimer's disease, along with their care partners. These gatherings offer opportunities for connection, conversation, and meaningful activities in a supportive, stigma-free setting. Program dates, times, and locations will be announced soon through town communication channels.

Business Spotlight

January's Spotlight Your Business Littleton Robotics

Recently, Town representatives visited Littleton Robotics and met with students and staff, gaining firsthand insight into the program's innovative, hands-on learning environment.



Established in 2016, Littleton Robotics is a local organization and home to FIRST Robotics Competition (FRC) Team 6328, Mechanical Advantage, a student-led robotics team that provides science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) learning opportunities for youth in Littleton and the surrounding area.

FRC teams participate in the FIRST Robotics Competition, an international STEM program in which students design, build, and program industrial-scale robots; compete annually in a themed game; work within real-world constraints such as deadlines, budgets, and safety requirements; and collaborate with mentors from engineering, technology, and manufacturing fields.

During the visit, students described their year-round efforts to design, build, and refine robots in preparation for competition, highlighting how the process deepens their technical skills and allows them to apply classroom learning in a real-world setting. Students also shared the wide range of roles available within the program, including mechanical and electrical engineering, software development, media, and project management, offering multiple pathways for students to learn new skills and expand their knowledge.

In addition to technical instruction, Littleton Robotics emphasizes leadership, teamwork, persistence, and problem-solving. Students work closely with dedicated adult mentors who foster a supportive environment that encourages confidence, collaboration, and continued learning.

As Littleton's first participant in the Spotlight Your Business program, Littleton Robotics showcases the positive impact that local organizations can have through education, mentorship, and community involvement. Since its founding, the program has fostered student growth, built practical skills, and inspired future innovators. We congratulate the students, mentors, and volunteers and wish them continued success in the years ahead!

Littleton Charter Committee

As part of the Charter Committee's ongoing work, over the next few months, we will highlight a different topic in each Town newsletter, related to how Littleton's government operates, along with a short survey to gather your feedback and ideas.

Elected vs. Appointed Town Positions: What's the Difference—and Why It Matters

Littleton's town government includes a mix of *elected* and *appointed* positions ranging from the Select Board, Board of Health, and Town Clerk to numerous committees and boards. As part of the Charter Committee's ongoing review, we're examining whether each position's current structure best serves our community today and into the future.

Elected positions allow residents to directly choose who represents them. This structure can make sense when a role involves significant policy-making, serves as a check or balance to other powers, or performs functions that are easy for voters to understand and evaluate. Elections can strengthen accountability and public trust, especially when there's strong interest and competition among well-qualified candidates.

Appointed positions, on the other hand, can be preferable when specialized expertise is essential, when coordination across departments is critical, or when the responsibilities are largely administrative and guided by state law. Appointment processes can ensure that candidates are selected for technical qualifications and that boards work more cohesively within the broader town organization. In reality, few roles fit neatly into one category. Each position should be considered on its own merits, balancing public accountability, effectiveness, and the need for professional expertise. Many Massachusetts towns periodically revisit these questions as community needs evolve.

The Charter Committee invites residents to share their views on how Littleton's positions and boards should be structured. Your feedback will help guide recommendations to ensure our local government remains responsive, efficient, and transparent.

Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee

Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee (BPAC) Request for Public Comment Tuesday January 20th 7:30PM Library Murray Meeting Room.

The Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee requests public input on improving the safety of the crosswalk at the intersection of King Street and Goldsmith Street. In the long term there will be a re-design of pedestrian crosswalks associated with the 550 King Street Common Project. In the interim, BPAC would like to make improvements to the existing pedestrian crossing to improve safety. The BPAC is considering the following as possible solutions:

- Additional signage (such as yield triangles)
- Repainting the crosswalk to have a 3 D effect and/or change the crosswalk color to yellow
- Add crash barrel islands
- Deactivate the current crosswalk and direct pedestrians to the adjacent Jennifer Street and Great Road crosswalks
- Other suggestions

The BPAC is interested in all public comment but especially residents who currently use the existing crossing at Goldsmith and King Street.

Superintendent Search

Hiring a successor for our retiring superintendent, Dr. Kelly Clenchy, is one of the most important decisions that we will make as a school committee. To ensure the best outcome and facilitate a smooth transition, we voted to hire the Massachusetts Association of School Committees (MASC) to support our search. One of our first tasks will be to reach out to the Littleton community for input on the most important qualities to seek in our next superintendent. We will use that input to craft a vision for the ideal candidate. Stay tuned for upcoming information about a survey and public forum to let your thoughts be known.

Shaker Lane Building Project

Following a nearly two-month process, the Shaker Lane School Building Committee voted to contract with Gilbane as the Construction Manager at Risk (CMAR) for building a new Shaker Lane School. A CMAR acts as a consultant and commits to delivering the project within a Guaranteed Maximum Price, taking on financial risk for overruns, fostering collaboration, and managing the project from start to finish. Our architect, Studio G, completed the Florence Roche School in Groton recently with the same team put forth by Gilbane. The team at Gilbane has personal connections to Littleton which gave the committee an additional level of comfort that this CMAR will be the best fit for this project.
