OBITUARY.—On the evening of Dec. 2, Charles M. Lawrence, an honored and highly-respected citizen of this place, passed on to the higher life. He was born in this town seventy-five years ago the fourteenth day of last October, and spent his boyhood days here. In his early manhood he traveled extensively in the west and also went to South America, where he remained some time. Returning, he sought a bride and in his choice he obtained one well fitted to grace his home and make it the dearest place on earth to him. He was possessed of a good deal of mechanical ingenuity and during the thirty-five years he has lived at Littleton Common he has been engaged in those pursuits, until failing health compelled him to relinquish them. He was ardently attached to his home, and his devotion to his wife was unbounded.

Mr. Lawrence's death was quite sudden. He had been in his usual health and in company with his wife spent Thanksgiving with her relatives in Chelsea. He returned home on Friday, Mrs. Lawrence remaining until Saturday night. Shortly after retiring he complained of not feeling well, and Mrs. Lawrence obtained some medicine from a nearby physician which relieved him. Sunday morning he was feeling better, so much so that he went to a neighbor's at night and made a short call. After going to bed he arose and said he was feeling badly, but soon lay down again and in a few minutes life was extinct. One sister survives him, Mrs. Eliza J. Hartwell of this place.
