Message From Your Select Board



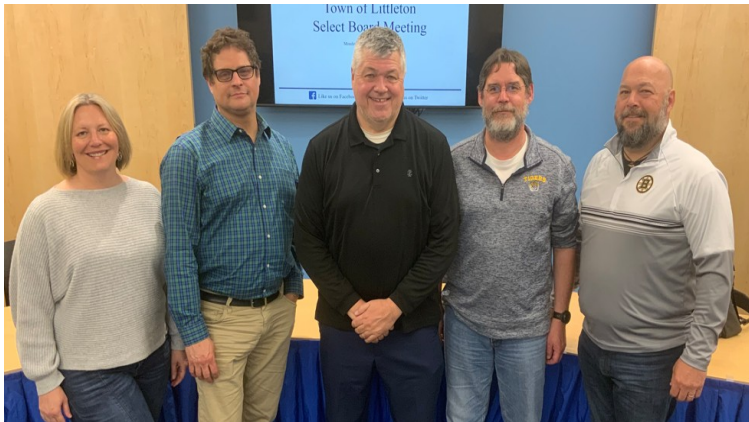
As April comes to an end, the Select Board is preparing for the May 6 Town Meeting. At our last meeting, the Select Board withdrew Article 13 from the warrant – no action will be taken on declaring the Shattuck Street building

surplus. Additionally, Article 12 was substantially revamped into three main parts. The first part of Article 12 will allow the town to petition for special legislation to allow us to redevelop the existing town hall as affordable housing and relocate to a new town hall. This special legislation is expected to take a year to work its way through the system and would be the first step in any project at the site. The second part of Article 12 prohibits any funds to be expended without town meeting approval to sell 37 Shattuck Street, lease back 37 Shattuck Street to continue using as a town hall, or the acquisition, design, development and construction of a new town hall. The third part of Article 12 expands the legislation to allow the Select Board to negotiate the terms of a contract* with a developer for this project, including the disposition of the existing building, leasing back of the site, and the relocation to a new site.

***Since no money has been appropriated, nothing can happen without a vote at a future town meeting.**

Prior to Town Meeting, there will be a presentation at 6 PM in the Middle School Cafeteria on the Shaker Lane School Project. There will be an update on the project and a chance to get your questions answered. We hope you will plan to attend.

Message From Your Select Board



The Town Election will be held on Saturday May 10 at the Middle School. In addition to the candidates, there is a ballot question to lower the number of marijuana cultivation facilities to zero (existing facilities will not be affected). This initiative must pass town meeting and the ballot to take effect.

The Select Board voted to make Lake Shore Drive a Safety Zone and lower the speed limit to 20 MPH within the zone. Look for those changes and signage in the coming weeks.

Thanks to all who attended the second orchard meeting with MAPC on April 16. A lively discussion was held on what the town should do with the land not covered by the lease. Once the survey is closed, MAPC will send a summary report of their findings to the Select Board.

The Center on Shattuck Street is almost complete! The grand opening is scheduled for Friday May 16 at 1 PM.

Our Assistant Town Administrator Ryan Ferrara will be leaving us after Town Meeting. Ryan has been a huge asset to the town and will be missed. We wish Ryan well in his future endeavors.

We hope to see everyone at Town Meeting on May 6 and at the Town Election on May 10!

From the Desk of the Town Administrator



The 2025 Annual Town Meeting will ask residents to support a plan to address two of Littleton's long-standing priorities: a permanent home for the Town Offices and affordable housing for seniors on fixed incomes. After hearing feedback and concerns from Littleton residents in the last few weeks, we are changing our approach to the potential redevelopment of Town Hall:



- The Select Board has voted to remove Article 13, which would have authorized the disposition of Littleton Town Hall to develop deeply affordable senior rental housing. While Motion 2 of Article 12 still enables the Town to pursue these projects, it extends the timeline of this process because it requires legislative approval as a Special Act. The extension will allow additional time for planning, analysis, and community conversations about the potential reuse of this property.
 - We have split Article 12 into multiple motions to be voted on separately by Town Meeting.
- ⇒ Motion 1 authorizes the Select Board to petition the legislature to enact special legislation that would exempt the Town from public construction and procurement laws for projects relating to the redevelopment of 37 Shattuck Street as affordable housing; the construction of a new Town Hall at another location; and the Town's interim lease of the site for continued use as Town Offices. **A "Yes" vote on Motion 1 does not authorize conveyance or redevelopment of the property at this time. Rather, it allows the Town to pursue legislative approval to establish its own competitive and fair process should the Town choose to pursue these projects while ensuring that construction workers are paid a proper wage.**
- ⇒ Motion 2 prevents any funds to be spent on the care, custody and control for the redevelopment of 37 Shattuck Street. **A "Yes" vote on Motion 2 would require that Town Meeting approve the expenditure of funds for the following projects: (1) sell 37 Shattuck Street to be developed as affordable housing; (2) lease back 37 Shattuck Street to use as a Town Hall while a new town hall is being constructed; and (3) contract for the acquisition, design, development, and construction of a new Town Hall in another part of Town. The Town has not yet appropriated any funds for these three projects.**
- ⇒ Motion 3 expands upon the special legislation by allowing the Town to act on the above projects and partner with developers. **A "Yes" vote would allow the Town to select one or more developers for these projects once the special legislation is enacted by the legislature.**

From the Desk of the Town Administrator



If Town Meeting approves one or both motions, the Special Act must then be adopted by the legislature, which would happen in 10-14 months. While we're waiting for the legislature, we have identified planning grants that will allow us to make a sound, factual recommendation and request to residents at a future Town Meeting if any of the above projects require appropriation of funds.

Ideally, we plan to pursue a grant to study to assess the feasibility of rehabilitating the existing 37 Shattuck Street building for housing versus demolishing it and building from the ground up. The study would also consider the applicability of federal and state historic preservation tax credits for which the project may be eligible if it retains most of the original structure and its defining characteristics, in addition to the Low-Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC). This analysis will allow us to come back to voters in the future — equipped with information on development scenarios and financial feasibility — to guide decision-making about funding if necessary.



The proposed reuse of the 37 Shattuck Street site involves creating 40 to 60 “deeply affordable” senior apartments—units with rents set low enough to be accessible to seniors with limited incomes. As many Littleton residents are aware, the state's definition of “affordable” often does not reflect what is genuinely affordable for our senior population. We hired Barrett Planning Group to examine senior housing needs in Littleton, and their findings show that the current housing stock will not keep pace with rising demand as the senior population grows. As seniors leave the workforce, their median household income declines significantly, and with age, many develop independent living disabilities. One data point shows that Littleton women 65 and over living alone are particularly vulnerable, with median incomes reaching just a quarter of the regional area median income for a one-person household. Littleton needs affordable and accessible housing options to stay within the community and prevent displacement.

With thoughtful coordination and proactive planning today, we can move forward on the critical community priority: creating deeply affordable senior housing. This multi-track approach promises a “win-win” outcome for all.

“Littleton seniors have been paying taxes here a lot longer than I have, and I think that if you ask a senior, the majority want to stay here, where they raised their kids, and they should be financially able to do that. They should have a voice. They deserve affordable options.”

Charter Committee Update



May Update: Littleton's Charter Committee

As shared in the April newsletter, Littleton has embarked on an important process to review its town government structure. The Select Board has convened a Charter Committee to assess how well our current system serves the needs of residents and whether any improvements could make local government more effective, responsive, and transparent.

What is a Town Charter?

A town charter is essentially our local government's constitution. It establishes the framework for how decisions are made, how responsibilities are divided, and how residents engage with their town government. Some Massachusetts towns operate under a formal charter, while others follow state laws and local bylaws. Littleton currently functions without a comprehensive charter, relying instead on bylaws and historical precedent. The Charter Committee will evaluate whether formalizing a charter could improve governance, accountability, and efficiency.

Why Does This Matter?

A well-structured town government ensures that services are delivered efficiently, policies are implemented effectively, and residents have clear avenues for participation. Over time, communities evolve, and what worked in the past may not be the best fit for today's challenges. The committee's goal is not change for the sake of change but rather to ask: Are we governing in the best way possible?

Key questions under review include:

- Does the current structure provide clear lines of accountability and decision-making?
- Are roles and responsibilities well-defined for town officials and boards?
- Could changes improve transparency and public engagement?
- Are there inefficiencies or outdated processes that could be improved?

Charter Committee Update



Who's Involved and What's the Process?

The Charter Committee is made up of residents appointed by the Select Board, bringing diverse backgrounds and perspectives to the discussion. Over the coming months, the committee will research best practices, study how similar towns operate, and seek input from town officials, employees, and residents. A preliminary report is expected in May 2026, followed by a final report with recommended changes by September 2026. These recommendations will be included in the warrant report for the Fall 2026 Special Town Meeting. Throughout this process, the committee will carefully consider any recommendations for changes, with a strong focus on maintaining what works well while improving areas that may need attention.

How Can Residents Participate?

Community input is essential to this process. The committee will hold public meetings, post updates, and solicit feedback to ensure that any proposed changes reflect the needs and values of Littleton's residents. If the committee ultimately recommends adopting a charter or making significant structural changes, residents will have the final say through a town-wide vote.

To stay informed, attend meetings, or share your thoughts, visit the town website for updates and meeting schedules. Your voice matters in shaping the future of Littleton's government!

Looking Ahead

The Charter Committee is in the early stages of its work, and no decisions have been made yet. This is an opportunity for the town to take a thoughtful look at how we govern ourselves and ensure that Littleton remains a well-run, engaged, and thriving community. The Center on Shattuck Street — March 2025 Update



During the month of March, Commodore achieved Substantial Completion right on schedule, on 3/12/25. Work continues toward a Final Completion deadline of 5/12/25, with remaining work including the final components of the PV System, Landscaping, Exterior Painting, Building Commissioning, Furniture/Equipment delivery and move-in, as well as final completion and testing of the Multipurpose Room AV system. Commodore also began work at the 31 Shattuck St. construction house, which is expected to continue into next month as a part of CCD 04 elective scope (authorized by the Town, to prepare this residence to be auctioned at the conclusion of the project). All work previously identified as remaining by the Roofing subcontractor was completed, including the downspout/cleanout mockup (approved by LLB). At the conclusion of March, Commodore formally received the Certificate of Occupancy from the Town's Building Department.

Also at the Construction House, the Project Team worked on field adjustments to the ANR Plan that will be needed to formally amend the property line between the Construction House and the Center on Shattuck. The topography between the buildings is such that the lot line, as originally conceived, would leave both sides with unusable and unmaintainable spaces, and field adjustments were determined to be in the Town's best interest. A "Temporary ANR Plan" will be presented to the Planning Board at the April meeting, with the understanding that the team will continue to revise this plan and present a final draft to the Planning Board in May instead. As reported previously, this delay is not expected to impact the overall Project Schedule.

The Center on Shattuck Street — March 2025 Update

At the building interior, Commodore completed and began working through the Punch Lists for both levels of the building. By the end of the month, the team was making great progress on all open items, and it is anticipated that the Punch List will be completed on schedule for the Final Completion date. Punch List items generally pertain to painting-touch-ups, minor defects in materials and/or incorrect materials (Multipurpose Room floor material was mislabeled at the factory and is being replaced), or defective mechanical system components. During the walkthrough by the Building Commissioner, two additional exit signs were requested, which will be installed as part of the Punch List/Closeout.

At the building exterior, Commodore completed all exterior site concrete work following Substantial Completion of the building. Beyond Plantings, the improving weather will enable asphalt paving (scheduled for 4/16), Line Striping(4/22), Sod placement (4/23) and hydroseeding (4/28). Seasonal weather will also allow exterior painting to be completed under appropriate cure temperatures; Commodore still anticipates that this timeframe will be in mid-April.

On the administrative side, Commodore is working to process changes and other documentation as the project draws toward its conclusion. Several minor changes, inspector requests (Exit Signs) and credits were discussed and are in the process of being packaged into formal Owner Change Orders as necessary.

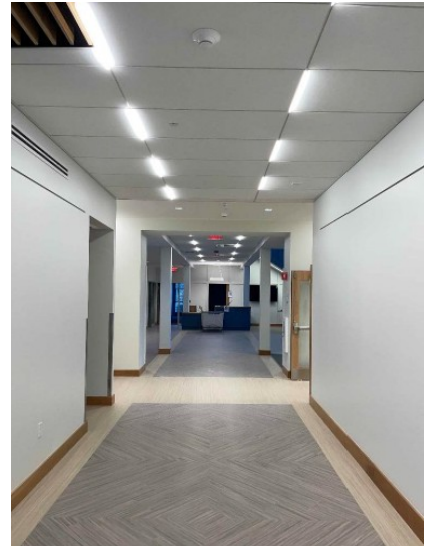
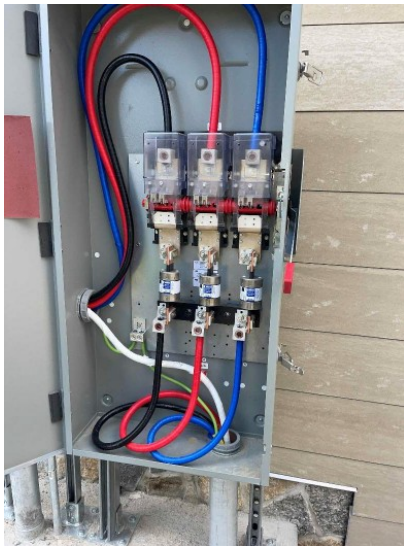
Both FF&E and AV / Technology continue to move forward – the FF&E order has a revised delivery date of 4/21, at which point it will be staged in the Multipurpose Room before being distributed through out he building. The A/V system is operational and is undergoing final testing before sign-off by Vertex and LCTV.

During the month of March, Classic Construction's team completed wall patching and miscellaneous drywall work throughout the building to stay ahead of flooring and painting work that would follow behind. As areas became available following the drywall and patching, the painters primed and painted the rooms, followed by Capital Carpet (flooring subcontractor) installing the new vinyl flooring. At the end of this reporting period, the second floor and first floor were complete, including vinyl wall bases. Floor prep work was also underway at the Lower Level to prepare for the vinyl flooring to be installed once delivered to the site. Flooring at the lower level is expected to be completed within the next reporting period. Classic has begun working to schedule the hardwood floor refinishing, which will need to be phased as work is completed around the building; the first area to be refinished will be the auditorium, scheduled to be completed toward the end of next month.

Structural work identified in last month's report has all been completed, inspected, and approved by the structural engineer, which has allowed Classic to close these areas with drywall and finish those spaces as indicated above. Throughout the month of March, Electrical work was ongoing throughout the building to install line voltage and data cabling to support the IT scope throughout the building. Their work also generally included installation of finish plates and light fixtures (previously approved by Change Order) as those fixtures arrived to the project site. Notably, the EV Charger location was prepped for installation of the device, and installation is scheduled to occur in early April by Brite Lite.

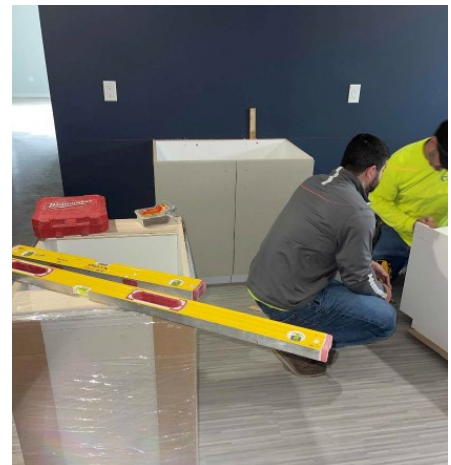

Classic's administrative efforts are ongoing to schedule Subcontractors and to process PCO items in coordination with the project team. Among these items has been working to address concerns from the Fire Department about sprinkler head replacements and improper clearances (*as of this report going to press, both of these issues have since been resolved*). Classic and their subcontractors are current with Certified Payroll documentation as of the conclusion of this reporting period.

LLB is coordinating with Vertex and Classic to process project changes, and is issuing guidance accordingly in the form of PCO Reviews and other Memoranda. Working together with Vertex and the Town, it is expected that a small batch of PCO's will be approved early in April by the PMBC, which will allow Classic to wrap up smaller items and reduce the list of outstanding tasks leading to project completion.

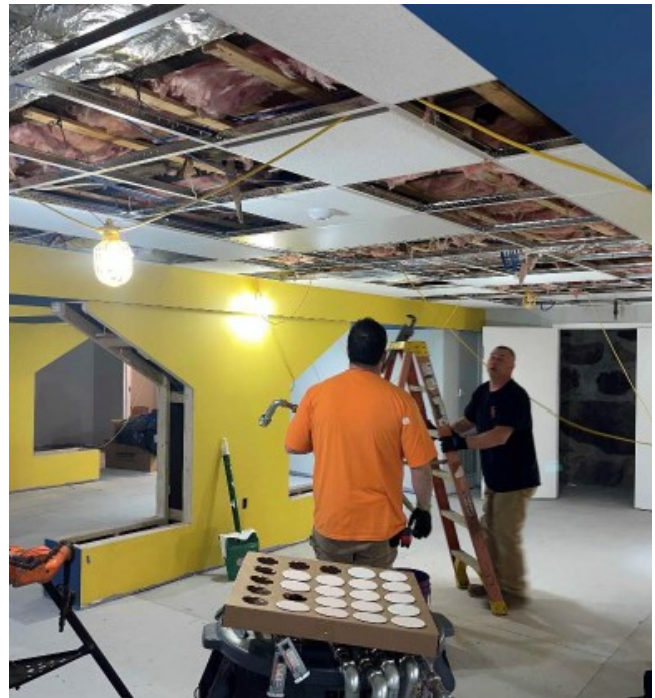
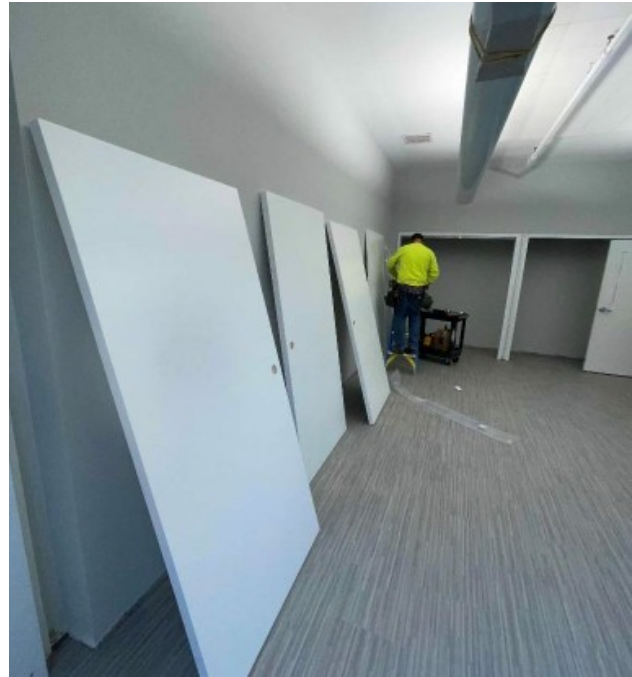
As of the close of this March reporting period, the project continues to show schedule slip-page similar to what was reported last month; Classic's most current Construction Schedule continues to show recovery by approximately one full month, and indications are that they may be able to better the dates that are currently shown. The project is currently targeting late May – early June 2025 for Substantial Completion. Vertex will continue to monitor schedule status.

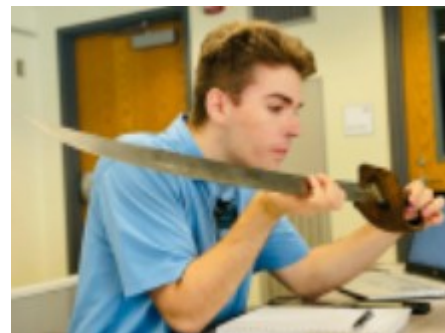

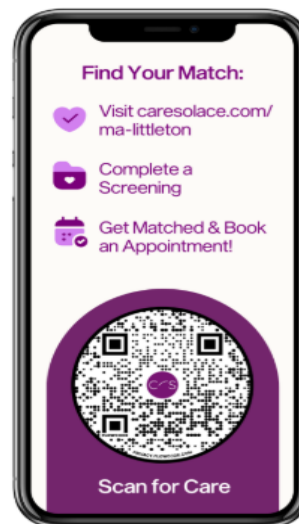

Supports our Pollinators

Spring is in full bloom! The Conservation Department would like to remind you that although you may be itching to get outside and start your landscaping, to first remember, our Pollinators are still hibernating, and their larvae are still developing in dead brush from last fall's crops. Littleton's expected last frost is between May 11 & 20th 2025, so until then try to refrain from disturbing overgrown and dead foliage to give those insects a chance to survive.

When you do begin planting, consider native species. Native plants supply a greater variety, quality and quantity of food and shelter for native wildlife. For example, one pair of chickadees require up to 9,000 caterpillars to get their chicks to fledging. Native oaks can support almost 600 different species of caterpillars, while the non-native Ginkgo tree may support only four. Native cherry trees can support almost 500 species of caterpillars, while non-native Zelkova has been shown to support none. At least 13 mammals and 32 species of birds rely on native oaks for food, and 473 moths and butterflies use them as host plants for their caterpillars. (Tallamy, 2019).

- How else can you help Pollinators?
- Try to avoid mowing part of your lawn—leave a Naturalized Area
- Raise your mower to a higher setting to allow small flowers, like wild violets, to remain.
- Restrict use of herbicides to avoid killing pollinators and the plants they rely on.
- Plant a Pollinator Garden consisting of native flowers and grasses such as:
 - ◊ Wild Bergamot
 - ◊ Butterfly weed
 - ◊ Helen's Flower
 - ◊ Wavy Hairgrass

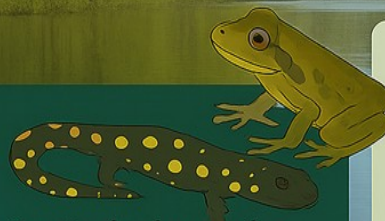

Meet the New Operator of the Nagog Hill Orchard: Bransfield Tree Company

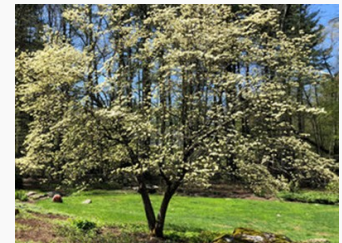


On March 26, 2025, the Town of Littleton executed a Lease and Management Agreement with Bransfield Tree Company of Stow, MA. Bransfield Tree Company is owned by Jonathan Bransfield who is an Arborist and tree preservation specialist of 30 Years. Jonathan grew up working in a family greenhouse business from age 8 to 18 and now lives with his 2 children, 2 cats, 3 dogs, and many many trees. Bransfield Tree Company will be operating the agricultural portion of the orchard to create a container-based native tree and shrub farm. Bransfield's

lease does not include control of the Orchard's house, lower barn, or lower house.

Bransfield's mission is to be a leader among tree loving people and caretaker of the New England ecosystems and the ecological services they provide. Bransfield seeks to enhance the site and neighborhood by planting many new permanent roadside trees and shrubs. The vision for Bransfield's container-based farm at Nagog Hill is to be a native tree and shrub farm that does not mine the existing soil but grows its plants in containers filled with a composted wood chip potting soil mix.

Along with producing native trees and shrubs, Bransfield Tree Company wants to plant several acres for permaculture fruit and nut trees and shrubs for low to no pesticide fruit and fruit tree production. They also aim to support ongoing efforts to breed pest-resistant varieties of ash, hemlock, elm, chestnut, butternut, and beech trees. Bransfield plans to incorporate traditional practices like hedge laying, pleaching, coppicing, and espalier into the landscape to offer commercial and educational opportunities. A tree farm along with the other tree-centric uses listed above will align quite nicely with the historical orchard use.



Education & Cultural Enrichment:

"Included in the vision for the tree farm is to use the land to train and develop more skilled and talented people for the preservation, restoration, and harmonization with our local native ecosystems and habitats. This would mean leading hands-on workshops and hosting experts for lecture series..." – **Bransfield Tree Co, LLC.**

Message From New Operator



Hello Littleton folks,

As of April 23rd, we have cleared all the old trees from the field adjacent to the barn (leaving a bunch of the old peach trees to see how they do and the rows of apples on Nashoba Rd). We've been pulling all the plastic irrigation tubing out of ground and processing it for disposal—it's a bit of a tangled mess under the grass. We will continue clearing as weather permits but are taking a patient approach due to the soil having been wet and not wanting to make ruts. We just started clearing the field next to the farmhouse, and I anticipate having that field cleared and stumps ground by June. Clearing out of all the trash around the barn should be tackled by end of June as well. We have approximately 3000 new trees potted and ready, with another 1000 in the works, to populate the fields as soon as the water supply is up and running. As of this writing, the barn's well still needs attention. I just bought a brand new 60 horse Kubota tractor with a brush mower for the farm so we can keep up on mowing all the fields. There is a massive amount of bittersweet vines growing through and over the apple trees in the farmhouse field so once those trees and stumps are cleared, we're going to start a high frequency mowing schedule for the remainder of 2025 to suppress the regeneration of that dreadful weed. Invasive weed suppression throughout the farm will begin in earnest this Fall.

Littleton's Climate Action Plan: Shaping a Sustainable Future

Littleton is taking a major step toward a more sustainable future with the development of a Climate Action Plan (CAP). This plan will provide a roadmap to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, increase resilience to climate change, and align with the town's long-term environmental and economic goals.

The CAP process, led by the Northern Middlesex Council of Governments (NMCOG) in partnership with the Town of Littleton and the Sustainability Committee, kicks off in April 2025 and will run through mid-2026. This effort is funded by an Energy Efficiency Community Block Grant (EECBG) provided to the towns of Dunstable, Littleton, Pepperell, and Townsend working in partnership with NMCOG. The EECBG grant program funded through the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law and administered by the Massachusetts Department of Energy Resources. Over the next year, the Town will gather data, engage the Community, and develop targeted strategies to address emissions, energy use, and climate resilience.

Community involvement will be key! A series of public forums will provide opportunities for residents to share input, ask questions, and help shape the plan:

- **Summer 2025:** Kickoff forum on greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions and priority areas.
- **Winter 2025-2026:** Midpoint check-in to refine goals and strategies.
- **Spring 2026:** Final forum on implementing the CAP.

In addition, a townwide survey (summer-fall 2025), focus groups (fall 2025-winter 2026), and engagement with elected leaders (fall 2025) will ensure broad participation across all sectors of the community.

By spring 2026, a draft CAP will be shared for public review, with the final plan presented to the Select Board for their endorsement prior to the May 2026 Town Meeting. Stay tuned for updates on how to get involved—your input will help shape Littleton's path to a more sustainable and resilient future!

Littleton educators use the MCAS data to drive instructional and curriculum decisions, so we're grateful to students and their families who help us get that important data. We hope all students and staff had a relaxing and fun week off!

We continue to make progress on plans for a new Shaker Lane School. Budget considerations are on everyone's mind. One of our long-term goals as a district has been to create in-district programming for students with disabilities, and over time we have reduced the number of students attending expensive out-of-district programs. Serving the needs of these students within the district has helped reduce the significant costs associated with outside placements. Even better, students with disabilities are able to be included as integrated members of our school community.

This approach requires educational spaces that are designed to meet the needs of all students, and are part of the design of the new Shaker Lane School. This is all part of the [Educational Plan](#) that was submitted with our application for partial reimbursement from the Massachusetts School Building Authority. When accepting our plan, the MSBA complimented the Shaker Lane Building Committee on the high quality of our Educational Plan supporting the need for a new building.

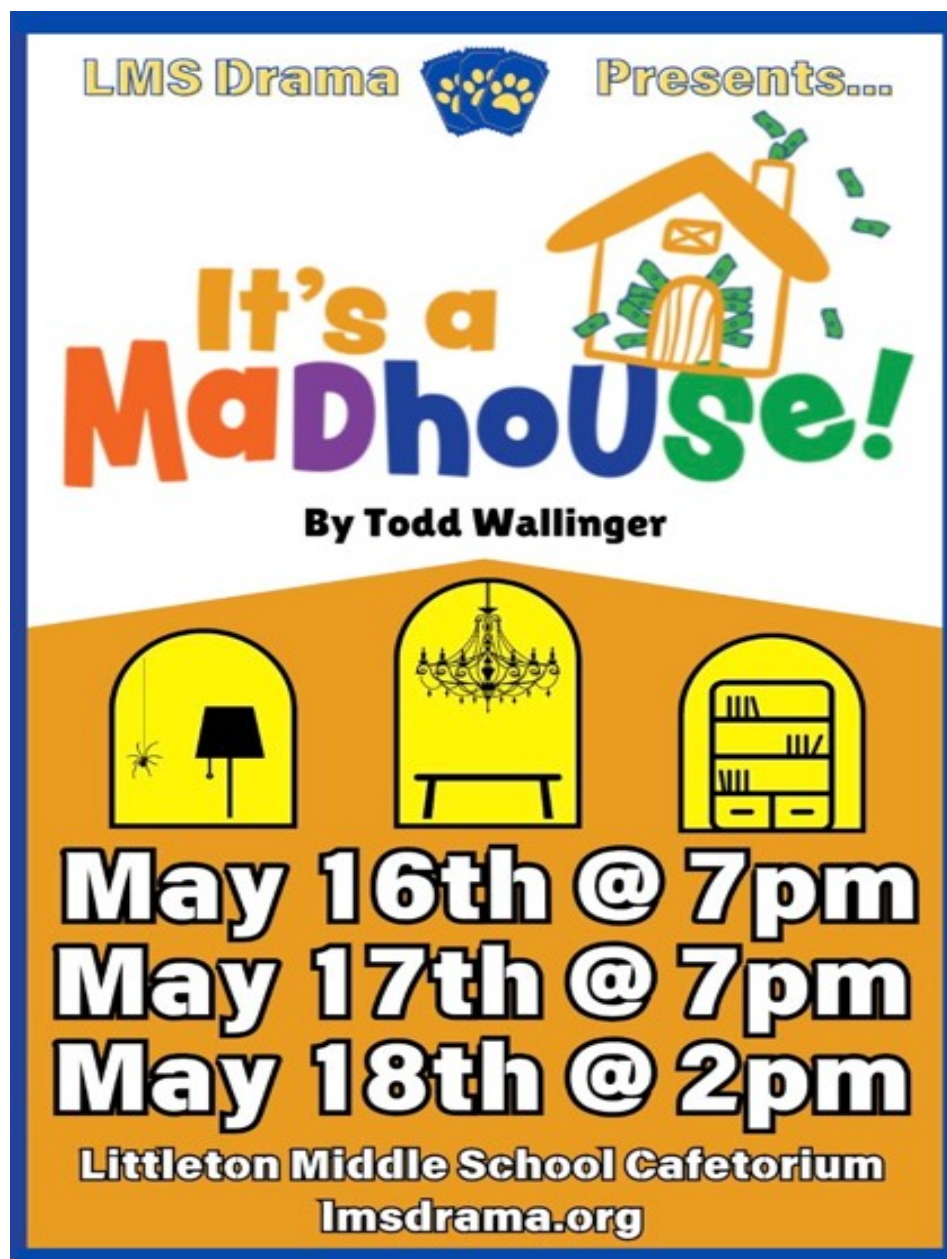

When to See the Full Moon in May 2025

May's full Flower Moon reaches peak illumination at **12:56 P.M. (EDT) on Monday, May 12.**

Why Is It Called the Flower Moon?

The full moon names used by *The Old Farmer's Almanac* come from many places, including Native American, Colonial American, and European sources. Traditionally, each full Moon name was applied to the entire lunar month in which it occurred, not solely to the full Moon.
