Message From Your Select Board



While summer often brings a slower pace, it is a season of active planning and transition for the Select Board. With the May elections concluded and the new fiscal year beginning on July 1, we reorganized our leadership roles—Chair, Vice-Chair, and Clerk—and reviewed committee and board assignments. Our annual retreat is scheduled for June 20, where we will review our progress on previous goals and establish new priorities for the year ahead.

This month also marks the successful conclusion of two major Town projects. School Administration and Parks and Recreation will be moving into their new offices at 37 King Street, and the Center on Shattuck Street has officially opened its doors. With these significant milestones achieved, our attention now turns to future planning efforts, including the next phase for the Shattuck Street complex and the New Shaker Lane Building Project.

On June 9, the Select Board held a joint meeting with the Finance Committee, School Committee, Shaker Lane Building Committee, and Permanent Municipal Building Committee to receive the latest updates on the Shaker Lane project. The presentation included revised cost estimates, comparative pricing data from similar projects across the state, and design updates. After discussion, the committees endorsed a geothermal HVAC system, chosen for its long-term cost efficiency and environmental benefits. This collaborative meeting underscores our shared commitment to ensuring open communication and alignment across committees on this critical project. Message From Your Select Board



In addition to long-range planning, the Town continues to prioritize roadway safety improvements:

- A safety zone has been established on Lake Shore Drive, reducing the speed limit to 20 mph.
- A state grant has enabled the installation of a rectangular rapid flashing beacon (RRFB) at Roxbury and Goldsmith, near Shaker Lane. The Town will also install additional RRFBs at that intersection.
- The Town has requested state approval for more RRFBs along King Street, including locations at Rogers Street (near Castle in the Trees), near Pondside Apartments, and at Baldwin Hill Road.
- The state has approved the following speed limit reductions:
 - o Great Road (Route 119) between Robinson Road and Acton Toyota is reduced to 30 mph.
 - o King Street (Route 110) between Ayer Road and I-495 is reduced to 35 mph.

We remain committed to thoughtful planning, coordination across departments and boards, and public safety as we look ahead to the opportunities and challenges of the coming year. Thank you for your continued engagement and support

From the Desk of the Town Administrator



Investing in the future of our community is a decision that requires careful consideration, balancing immediate needs with long-term benefits. When it comes to educational infrastructure, communities often face a choice between rehabilitating an outdated school and adding modular classrooms or building a brand-new school. While both options have their merits, investing in the construction of a new school generally offers significant advantages that align with a community's best interests. I'm a firm believer Littleton will benefit more from constructing a new elementary school rather than simply rehabilitating the existing Shaker Lane School and adding "temporary" modular classrooms.



One of the primary reasons we are proposing to build a new elementary school is the durability and longevity it offers. The existing outdated school building, no matter how well-maintained over the years, has reached a point where repairs and renovations are less cost-effective than starting anew. Continual repairs to the building have resulted in escalating maintenance costs, potential building closures, and disruptions to students' learning environment. Conversely, the proposed purpose-built new school is designed with modern materials and technologies that ensure durability for decades, thus reducing ongoing repair and maintenance expenses.

What's the ROI (Return on Investment)? The Select Board, School Committee, Finance Committee, School and Town Administrations, and everyone working on this project are all very sensitive to the project's cost; however, over time, its lower maintenance costs and higher resilience make it a more cost-effective investment. Although modular classrooms provide short-term relief, they won't address the underlying structural issues, and their temporary nature means additional costs for replacement or expansion in the future. Building a new school, therefore, offers better financial predictability and stability.

The physical environment of any school has a significant impact on students' learning experiences. The design of the proposed modern, purpose-built school will incorporate current educational standards, safety protocols, and technological advancements. Some of the features include, but are not limited to, flexible learning spaces, integrated technology infrastructure, energy-efficient designs, and improved acoustics and lighting, all of which will create a conducive learning environment.

The current Shaker Lane School lacks adequate space, proper ventilation, and accessibility features, hindering the teacher's ability to teach and the students' ability to learn. Modular classrooms, while temporarily helpful, often lack the full integration of facilities, resources, and aesthetic quality necessary for fostering engagement and collaboration among students. The proposed new school is designed specifically to meet Littleton's educational goals, providing tailored spaces for STEM education, arts, physical activity, and social-emotional development.

From the Desk of the Town Administrator



Building codes and safety standards evolve over time. The school building as it stands today does not meet contemporary safety requirements, including seismic standards, fire codes, and accessibility guidelines. Rehabilitating the building for compliance will be costly and may still leave gaps in safety.



The proposed new school will be constructed from the ground up, meeting current safety and accessibility standards, ensuring all students and staff are protected and can access facilities without barriers. This includes ADA-compliant entrances, specialized classrooms, and emergency egress routes. Such improvements foster an inclusive, safe, and welcoming environment essential for a thriving educational community.

Littleton is evolving and so are our educational needs. The current Shaker Lane School will no longer accommodate our growing student populations or changing curriculum demands. The rehabilitation and modular classrooms offer temporary expansion, but they'll lack the flexibility Littleton needs for long-term growth.

The proposed new school is designed with an expandable infrastructure, larger, more adaptable spaces, and modern utilities that can support future expansion, if necessary. The smart design principles will incorporate green spaces, outdoor learning areas, and community facilities, making the proposed new school a central hub for neighborhood development and engagement.

In so many communities, constructing a new school often acts as a catalyst for community pride and economic stimulation. We are very fortunate here in Littleton because we already have that. What this project will do is send a clear and convincing message that Littleton is investing in our children's future. This project itself will create jobs during construction, benefiting local contractors and suppliers. Moreover, a new school can increase property values, as modern, attractive schools are highly desirable. This boost in property values will be reinvested into other municipal services and infrastructure.

The school's design emphasizes sustainability. As with the Reuben Hoar Library and the newly constructed Center on Shattuck Street, energy-efficient systems have been integrated; renewable energy sources, green roofing, and eco-friendly materials. Such features will reduce operational costs and the environmental impact over the building's lifespan. Rehabilitating the existing school limits us by the existing structure and will not achieve anything close to the same level of efficiency. Modular classrooms, although often more portable, are not built with sustainability in mind, leading to higher energy usage and a smaller ecological footprint.

Rehabilitating the existing school and adding modular classrooms will cause significant disruptions to students' daily routine, including noise, construction dust, and temporary relocation of classes. Such interruptions will negatively impact learning and the emotional well-being of the students. The site for the proposed new school will minimize disruption to the learning environment. Once completed, our students will transition into a state-of-the-art facility designed specifically to meet their educational needs, providing a stable and consistent learning environment.



In conclusion, rehabilitating the outdated Shaker Lane School and adding modular classrooms might appear as a more affordable or quicker solution at first, but the long-term benefits of constructing a new elementary school far outweigh those short-term gains. The new school will provide a durable, safe, and adaptable learning environment that promotes better educational outcomes, community pride, and environmental sustainability. Investing in a purpose-built facility reflects Littleton's commitment to our children's future and ensures that the infrastructure remains beneficial for generations to come. Ultimately, building a new elementary school is a strategic, forward-thinking decision that aligns with Littleton's best interests, fostering growth, safety, and excellence in education for years to come.

Investing in a new elementary school not only provides a safe and conducive learning environment for students but also serves as a catalyst for hosting community events, fostering stronger bonds among residents, and creating a sense of shared pride. It's an investment in Littleton's vitality, resilience, and potential for achievement.

Sewer Update

The Contractor (Revoli) continues to chip through ledge on King Street, just past Farmstead. They were able to install two manholes on either side of the duct banks at the King Street IBM entrance and connect those two manholes with pipe.

They have under 100' left of pipe installation remaining to connect the system to the first manhole at IBM and then approximately 400' to go from the second manhole to the Westford line.

All this work should be completed in 3-4 weeks. Paving operations will begin Monday, June 30 to start paving from the Littleton High School to Russell Street. Once this is completed, Revoli intends to pave some parts of the Common, but LELWD and the town are still coordinating this with Mass DOT.

Charter Committee Update

The Charter Committee continues its review of Littleton's government structure, with guidance from the Collins Center for Public Management. Following a structured work plan, the committee has focused first on the legislative branch—how Town Meeting functions, how warrants are prepared and shared, and the roles of key officials.

Recent discussions have expanded to the executive branch—particularly the roles of the Select Board and Town Administrator. These conversations aim to clarify how core functions like budgeting, personnel, and facility management are currently handled, and where there may be opportunities for improvement.

Input from town staff, elected officials, and experts continues to inform the committee's work. Draft charter language is being developed section by section, alongside a list of potential bylaw and policy updates for future consideration.

This summer, the committee will continue its deep dive into the executive and legislative branches, as well as selected boards and committees.

Public engagement remains central to the process. All meetings are open to the public and available via LCTV and the town website. Questions or feedback are welcome at CharterCommitteeQuestions@littletonma.org.

The committee looks forward to sharing more updates as its work progresses.

EFFECTIVE JUNE 30, 2025 - HVAC (Heating, Ventilation, and Air Conditioning)

MANUAL J, MANUAL S, & MANUAL D REQUIRED WITH HERS REPORT

Manual J is the recognized standard for calculation heating and cooling loads in residential buildings ensuring HVAC systems are properly sized for efficiency and comfort.

Manual S provides specific procedures for selecting HVAC equipment against a set on Manual J loads and design conditions. Manual S use OEM (Original Equipment Manufacturer) data and specifies how large or small the selected HVAC equipment capacity can be when compared to the Manual J load calculation.

Manual D design for HVAC includes a comprehensive set of guidelines to ensure the proper sizing, layout, and configuration of ductwork. These guidelines are essential for maintaining energy efficiency, comfort, and performance in HVAC systems.

For replacement of an existing dwelling: Manual J block load and Manual S Equipment Selection Reports are needed if the existing ducted distribution is being used.

An existing dwelling if you are adding an addition or more floor area it would be considered new distribution which would require room by room load calculations to include Manual S, and Manual D.

July is Extreme Heat Awareness Month — Know the Signs, Protect Your Health

Hot and humid days are becoming more common in New England, and extreme heat can be deadly—especially for seniors, children, and those with chronic illnesses. The Health Department urges all residents to recognize the risks and take action.

Heat exhaustion symptoms include:

- Dizziness, nausea, or fainting
- Headache or rapid heartbeat
- Heavy sweating and cold, clammy skin

To stay safe in high temperatures:

- Drink water often, even if you're not thirsty
- Avoid outdoor activity between 10 AM and 4 PM
- Wear light, loose-fitting clothing
- Check on elderly neighbors and those without A/C
- Never leave children or pets in cars—not even for a minute

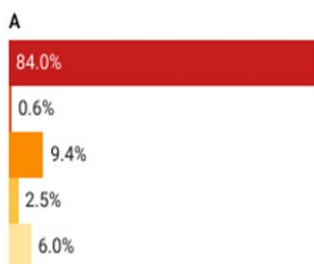

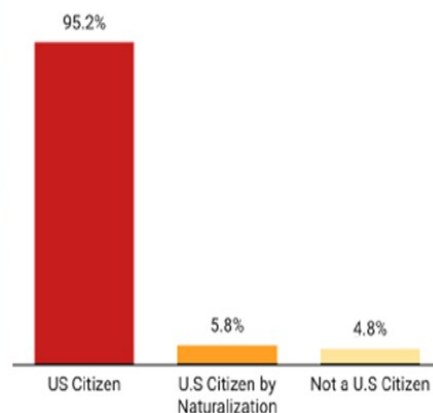

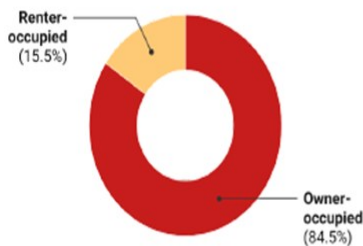

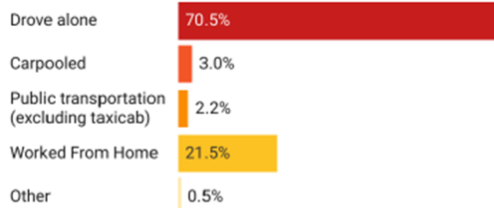

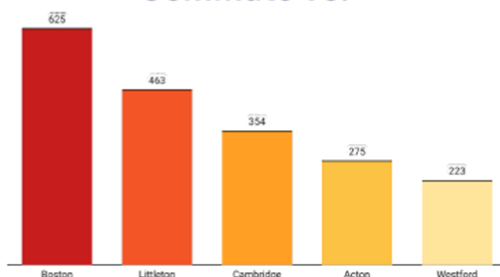

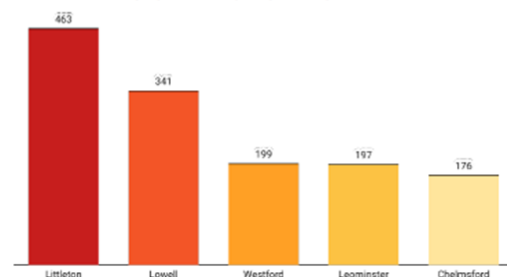

On June 2, representatives from Littleton and Acton joined in the marking the border between our two towns. These markers are located along the town borders where a road crosses the town boundaries or where the border changes direction. They were placed in the 1800s and are supposed to be located every 5 years (but it has been awhile!)



Mark Rambacher, Select Board Member; Linda Stein, Historical Commission Chair; Andrea Curran (resident behind the scenes, submitting pictures) along with representatives from Acton, marking the Town Boundaries.



We located and painted the markers on Newtown Road, Fort Pond Road, Nagog Hill Road, and in the Acton Water District by Nagog Pond. We located the marker at Nashoba Road, but it was broken and in need of repair. The marker at the corner of Acton, Littleton, and Boxboro is missing – it would be in the middle of the Route 2 on ramp). We plan to meet up with Westford in the future and mark the boundary (near Bobby's Ranch).



It was great to get out and meet neighbors from the surrounding communities. We plan to locate and refresh the other border markings. If anyone is familiar with their locations or would like to join us, please reach out!

Greetings from the Littleton School Committee!

As the school year comes to a close, it's time to reflect on the many accomplishments of our students and staff. Littleton Public Schools remains one of the top districts in the state by many measures, which reflects the commitment, creativity, and compassion of our teachers and leaders. We have much to be proud of, and would like to express our gratitude to our staff as they head out to some well-deserved time off.
